HELL Reading Challenge 2025



Everything you need to know in six easy steps

STEP 1

What is the Hell Reading Challenge?

The HELL Reading Challenge is a well-established programme that over the past 10 years has been hugely successful in getting tamariki reading and enjoying the pleasures of stories.

The HELL Reading Challenge is free, and it is so easy! Children receive a stamp on their HELL Reading Challenge pizza wheel for each book they read. Once they have read seven books, children can exchange their completed wheel for a free 333 kids' pizza from any HELL store.

Just follow the rules below:

- Every child/student must read 7 books to fill up their wheel so that they are able to receive their free 333 kids' pizza from their local HELL store.
- There is no limit on the number of pizza wheels a student can fill up during the year, provided the wheels
 are stamped and authenticated by a school teacher or librarian. But only one wheel can be redeemed per
 child per visit.
- The child/student must redeem their pizza wheels IN PERSON and before the expiry date, which is
 Saturday 31 January 2026. Each wheel will feature detailed rules and regulations, as well as a serial number
 and QR code that will be traced back to your school/library. We do this to ensure a high standard of conduct.
 It's our honour code!





How can you run the programme at your school or library?

- Register your school or library at https://forms.gle/nhDRMy5LzcFKGG2U7. You may want to select a team leader to coordinate pizza wheel orders.
- Decide on how you want to run the programme at your school or library.

 To show you how the Reading Challenge works, we've made an instructional video, which you can find at www.nzbookawards.nz/hell-reading-challenge/ we recommend that you watch this first.

In step 5 you'll find more ideas on how to run the challenge at your schools and libraries. These have come from hard-working teachers and librarians who have run the initiative effectively in the past few years. Whether you take these ideas and run with them as-is, or you tweak them to suit your style, is completely up to you.

And to add even more interest and incentive, libraries and schools are offered the optional additional opportunity to take tamariki on Hell's Great NZ Book Trip – where they can discover the rich tapestry of New Zealand literature right around the motu, whether it is the author, a location or a setting in the story. There will be online author events and other activities to enjoy. You can find out more about the Book Trip promotion on our website.

- Display the striking posters and table talkers supplied with your registration pack, to let keen readers know they can take part in this exciting challenge.
- With your class or team, talk about how you will record which books children are reading and the number. A reading log and an activity to prove that the students have read the book are recommended. They can use our specially designed review cards (available for download from our website) to describe their impressions of the books they read.
- 5 Start your students on their HELL Reading Challenge!
- 6 Start signing the HELL Reading Challenge pizza wheels.
- Keen readers can qualify for a free pizza every time they complete an authenticated wheel by reading another 7 books. So it works for both slower and confident readers.





What is the Hell Reading Challenge wheel?

The HELL Reading Challenge pizza wheel has 7 slices to sign off each time a book is completed. Here's how wheels should be completed and authenticated:



Children get each slice signed off by the teacher or librarian after they have read one book and completed a follow up activity (or whatever you think is suitable for your age group).



When all slices have been completed, wheels should be authenticated by the teacher or librarian, and with the school or library stamp. Be careful not to write or stamp over the QR code.



Fully completed and stamped pizza wheels can be redeemed at the local HELL Pizza store.

NB: The sample pizza wheels pictured are from a previous year. A new wheel design will be used in 2025.

HELL Pizza stores have been given an example of what a 2025 HELL Reading Challenge wheel will look like when completed.

Note each pizza wheel has a separate serial number and QR code, and can be traced to prevent fraud. We need your help policing the wheels as we don't want anyone to take advantage of the generosity of HELL Pizza.

The rules in Step 4 will help you run the challenge. Thank you for your consideration!





Are there rules and regulations?

Yes, but they are not too onerous. As we all know, running a small business in New Zealand, or anywhere, is a real challenge. The owners of the HELL Pizza franchises are champions of our Reading Challenge, and we want to make sure that no one participating in it will take advantage of their generosity and goodwill. There are strict rules around the Reading Challenge, and with your help we can help police the pizza wheels, and the challenge, to ensure that all students participate fairly.

- Each wheel is good for one 333 kids' pizza from any HELL store nationwide.
- Each pizza wheel must be signed by a teacher/librarian from your school or library and stamped with your official school/ library stamp.
- The HELL Reading Challenge is open to students in Years 1-8.
- Pizza must be picked up in person in-store only. One 333 kids' pizza per visit per child.

In special circumstances, schools or public libraries may be able to arrange redemptions for small groups of students who have completed their pizza wheels. These group orders must be booked at least two weeks in advance, and are not available on Fridays. Please email **readingchallengeanzbookawards.org.nz** with requests for group orders.

- HELL stores have the right to refuse this offer in cases of suspected fraud, when presented with unsigned and unstamped pizza wheels, or when group orders have not been pre-booked.
- Pizza wheels are non-transferable for money.
- Schools and libraries can order wheels until Wednesday 3 December 2025 (stocks permitting).
- All participating schools and libraries need to display the HELL Reading Challenge posters and table talkers supplied to them.

Would you like some ideas for running the Hell Reading Challenge?

How schools and libraries run this programme varies considerably. Some schools require students to complete a task related to the books that have been read, such as a small report or book reviews. Others have a conversation, asking pertinent questions about the books that tamariki have read. How you do this is up to you and what works in your classroom or library. Here's some feedback from teachers and librarians on what they have done in the past few years:

> We introduced the HELL Reading Challenge as part of our annual Pinehaven School book week. Each student was given a named pizza wheel as part of a class set. We advertised the Challenge in our school's newsletter, Facebook page and posters around the school.

Some classes used the Challenge as a way to encourage senior students to read with junior students during buddy time. Suddenly senior students were very interested in which picture books made good read alouds. The Challenge helped create a buzz about reading around the school, and was very popular with students, teachers and whānau alike. Our staff also enjoyed using the free online workshops with authors.

Competition is a great motivator, and so we have a Wall of Fame display for people who have completed an entire pizza wheel for the Hell Reading Challenge. They get their name and room number on a slice of pizza – the display is next to the library door and gets lots of attention. There's ongoing competition among the students for who will earn enough 'slices' to complete a whole pizza first!

We celebrate the Reading Challenge during Term 3 and 4 and it's led by the student librarians in the school library. It's worked really well for a fun activity, particularly over the winter months.

For our younger students, they come into the library at lunchtimes and tell us about a book their book. For the older students they fill in the winners receiving a book prize.
